The list below is intended to help you prepare for a variety of classes and activities. We have provided approximate costs based on our research, but we recommend shopping around to find the most affordable options.

Please note that unless stipulated, clothing should be black and free of any visible logos.

1.	Two pairs of black jazz/yoga pants/leggings (cotton/lycra mix) - these or equivalent items will be needed during week 2	£12 (per item)

WORLD THEATRE HISTORY IN CONTEXT

For your work in Year 1 you will be required to purchase:

- Theatre Histories: An Introduction (3rd Edition) by Tobin Nellhaus, Bruce A McConachie, Carol Fisher Sorgenfrei, Tamara Underiner

This is the textbook that is used for the module on 'World Theatre History in Context' and it is also a useful tool for later work. It is available in paperback from Amazon for £37.99 (used copies are cheaper)

You should be familiar with and have copies of the following epics, which form the basis for much of world drama:

- The Iliad, The Odyssey (Homer) | approx. £10
- Ramayana (Valmiki) | approx. £10-£15
- Mahabharata | approx. £10-£15

All of these are available in modern translations, and it is perfectly acceptable to get abridged copies or even children's versions. I recommend the Penguin Classics editions, which are widely available and not expensive. They are all also available online and on Kindle, but these are not always the most accessible translations.

In addition, it is important that you purchase the following play texts, all published by Oxford Classics, Penguin or Nick Hern Books (NHB) and available to order online (e.g. Amazon) or at good theatrical bookshops:

- Fuente Ovejuna, De Vega (tr. L Boswell) | £3.99 (NHB)

TERM 3:

- Ibsen 4 Plays: Doll's House, Ghosts, Hedda Gabler, The Master Builder (tr. James McFarlane et.al.) | £5.99 (Oxford Classics)

Please buy the editions indicated because the translations have been selected with care and it is important that you all can be working from the same text. Cheaper used copies are often available. Online versions are not acceptable. Please let us know if you have any problems acquiring them. You can sometimes get used copies at discount prices. We will be working through this list of plays in seminar classes throughout the year and you should have all of the plays from the start so you won't have to worry about acquiring copies at short notice. You will note that they are inexpensive and, where possible, we have listed collections of plays that give you even more value for money.

For students intending to pursue work in the industry, we recommend the following professional investments. These expenses typically become relevant towards the end of Year 2. Indicative costs are subject to change and are listed in addition to published figures for 'additional course costs'.
