1. Practical Books:

 - Stanislavski, Chekhov and the Moscow Arts Theatre
 - Bertolt Brecht and the Berliner Ensemble
 - Joan Littlewood and Theatre Royal Stratford East the origins of East15
 - Post-War and contemporary European Theatre especially in Poland, Germany and Netherlands
 - Peter Brook and the RSC, Theatre of Cruelty, Bouffes du Nord
 - The Royal Court Theatre and post-war and contemporary British Theatre
 - Non-European acting traditions, especially those of South and East Asia India, Bali,
 Japan, Korea, and China and narrative traditions of Central Asia and Africa
 - Commedia del Arte, Clown and Physical Theatre Italian and French traditions especially Jacques Lecoq and Complicite
 - Non-text theatre and its influence on contemporary acting Augusto Boal and Forum Theatre, Pina Bausch and Dance Theatre, Punchdrunk and Immersive/Site Specific Theatre
